Introduction

This report provides an overview of the planning, the meetings, and most importantly, the work produced by the participants in the series of three Ojai Valley-wide Discussions held in 2006 and 2007. The narrative below provides a summary of the meeting process, while the various appendices contain the work product of the participants and the information provided to the participants by Supervisor Bennett's Office. The narrative and appendices together comprise the master document and recommendations of the Discussions participants.

Overview

In response to requests from Ojai Valley residents, Ventura County Supervisor Steve Bennett held a series of public meetings in 2006 and 2007 designed to allow residents to develop a better understanding of and meet people from the various communities of the Ojai Valley. In addition the meetings focused on brainstorming win-win projects to improve the Valley that would generate broad support among residents valley wide. The goal of the Ojai Valley-wide Discussions was to build a cohesive group to work towards common goals that would benefit the Ojai Valley.

Outreach

We set out to attract a wide range of ages, cultures, backgrounds and perspectives in order to have a critical mass of residents that adequately represented the Ojai Valley. We pursued this goal by:

- 1) Mailing an invitation to every household in the Ojai Valley; this amounted to over 12,000 invitations total (Appendix a).
- 2) Attaching a business reply card to each invitation so that residents could respond free of charge.
- 3) Providing all initial outgoing information from our office in Spanish as well as English.
- 4) Distributed a survey to participants who registered for the first meeting, which allowed us to assess where we needed to focus our outreach (Appendix b)
- 5) Placing several notices and press releases in the Ojai Valley News.
- 6) Developing a website to conveniently communicate, provide information and allow residents to register online and become part of a listserv.
- 7) Asking those who had registered to invite their friends and neighbors to attend.

There was a strong response to the invitation; 520 individuals registered for the first Ojai Valley-wide Discussion set for November 12, 2006, and an additional 98 residents wished to be on our mailing list. With the large number of people attending, it was necessary to hold the meeting at the Nordhoff High School Gymnasium.

The Basic Discussion Process

In order to enable all participants in the series of meetings to share and discuss the issues most important to them, the meeting plan centered around small discussion tables. Groups of seven participants, ideally from different areas of the valley, would sit together and discuss their views and perspectives. The discussions would be facilitated by a Table Leader. Our goal was to provide enough information that participants would have a shared understanding of basic topics in the Ojai Valley before they began their discussions. After conversing on several topics, tables would bring the issues they agreed upon to the entire group. In the end, there would be a substantial list of issues collected from each table representing the range of concerns developed by the entire group of attendees. With the use of an audience response system keypad, each table would be able to rank issues. This would narrow down the list to a workable size.

The First Ojai Valley-wide Discussion: November 12, 2006 2:00-4:30 PM (Agenda- Appendix c)

In order to encourage opportunities to meet new people and hear new perspectives, each registered participant was assigned to a seat. . Couples were encouraged to sit at different tables. Arrangements were in place to register and seat anyone in attendance who didn't pre-register. Table Leaders were recruited in advance from the list of registered participants and attended an orientation/training session prior to the meeting. Each Table Leader was provided

with a packet containing all the forms and response sheets to be turned in as well as individual folders and nametags for each participant.

Of the 520 registered participants, 266 attended the first meeting. To facilitate lively discussion, tables with empty seats were consolidated. The meeting began promptly at 2:00pm with Greg Bayless as the host and Dr. Robert Fraise as the moderator.

Ojai Valley Statistics Presentation

The meeting commenced with a PowerPoint Presentation on the Ojai Valley. The presentation provided background on the eight different communities of Ojai. The eight identified communities for this presentation were Casitas Springs, Oak View, Mira Monte, Meiners Oaks, City of Ojai, East End and Upper Ojai. The information provided described each community, with acreage, populations, ethnicity, and age of each community.

The presentation also identified some of the ways residents in the Ojai Valley are linked together and are interdependent.

- 1) Geographically through a unified watershed, a single air shed and four roadways in and out of the Ojai Valley.
- 2) Socially, residents are linked through Valley-wide organizations such as HELP of Ojai and the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy.
- 3) Economically, residents share the major inflow of dollars to the Ojai Valley through tourism and government.

The divided structural arrangement of local governments in the Valley can pose challenges to Valley residents as they navigate occasional differences in policies or jurisdictional boundaries. The Ojai Valley is divided by multiple government agencies for providing the basic services of schools, recreation, water, and government representation. The presentation provided participants with a shared foundation of information as they began group discussions.

Group Discussion

Participants at each table were asked to create two lists of issues that could improve the Ojai Valley:

First List: The criteria for the first list were issues that are important and possess likely solutions that appear doable and will relatively quickly win broad support.

Second List: The criteria for the second list were issues that are important but solutions appear relatively challenging and will take more time to win broad support.

Participants were given time to write down the issues that were important to them on their individual response form. Each participant was then allotted time to present their issue to their table and state their case. Once all issues had been presented, each table voted on every issue to determine the top two issues from each list for each table. The four top issues from each table were then brought to the front of the room to be put into categories. While many participants' individual issues did not make the larger categories list, their issues were not discarded. All individual response forms (Appendix d) were turned in at the end of the meeting and compiled (Individual Responses)

Participant Contact Information: Included on the individual response form was the option for participants to provide their personal contact information to be collated into a

directory for the next meeting to facilitate communication amongst participants (Directory-Appendix e).

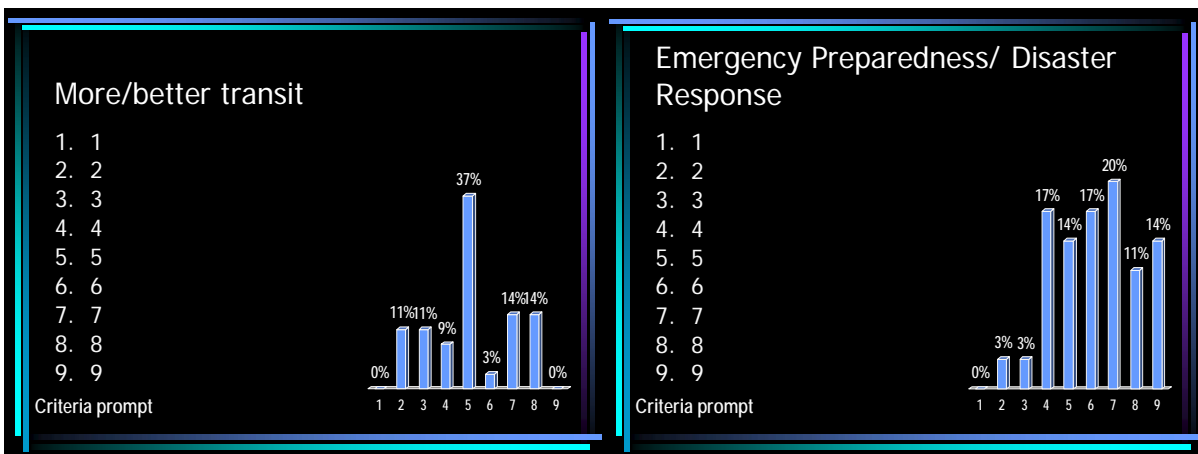
Voting

As the table issues were being put into categories for both lists, it became apparent that the issues submitted as “doable” and the issues submitted as “challenging” were very similar. In order to create a workable list for the entire group of attendees to vote on, the two lists were consolidated into one list. From there the list was dropped into a PowerPoint slide for each table to rank in order of most important. The top eight items were:

More/better transit
Emergency Preparedness/ Disaster Response
Hospital emergency room
Valley-wide communication
Valley-wide plan for development
Gangs Crime
Sustainability/ green building
Traffic
After school youth programs and facilities

Results of First Discussion

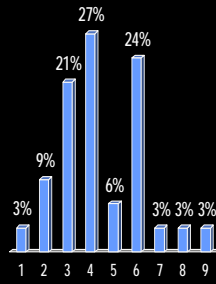
With the use of an audience response system, each table was able to rank each issue 1-9, with 9 being most important and 1 being least important. Each table first had to vote among themselves to decide how they would rank each issue. Once a decision was made, the table leader entered their ranking, which the computer then averaged. Because the issue of affordable housing was mistakenly omitted from the list, the moderator instructed the audience to include affordable housing in their ranking. After the computer tallied the results, the meeting adjourned at 4:45pm. The results of the audience response system voting are as follows:

Post Meeting

After the meeting, Supervisor Bennett and staff reviewed all of the information collected from individual participants and each table.

All the responses were entered into a data base and categorized by whether they were “Easy” to do and probably have broad support or “Hard” to win broad support and get accomplished, and then grouped again by category such as Disaster Preparedness, Recreation, etc. (Appendix f)

The entire list of individual and table issues was posted on the Ojai Valley-wide Discussions website.

Preparation for Meeting Two

The individual and table issues submitted at the first meeting were consolidated and refined into the following core list of issues and action items:

Disaster Plan/Preparedness, CERT & Hospital

- 1) Improve our ability to be prepared for a disaster
- 2) Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program
- 3) Improve communications during emergencies
- 4) Improve the hospital and emergency room

- 5) Increase awareness of and better communicate the existing County and City disaster Plans

Recreation Services Valley wide

- 1) Create a valley-wide recreation district
- 2) Improve existing play fields and expand the number of fields available
- 3) Expand recreational programs particularly for youth
- 4) Implement one of the miscellaneous specific suggestions after the group ranking

Transportation and Mass Transit

- 1) Improve public transit in and out of the valley
- 2) Decrease car use within the valley by expanding the trolley/public transit and use of other transportation alternatives
- 3) Improve road maintenance
- 4) Improve efficiency of traffic flow

Environmental Improvements- Preserving Open Space-Global Warming- Sustainability

- 1) Preserve existing open space in the Valley
- 2) Promote green building valley wide
- 3) Create an environmental education program
- 4) Develop an environmental plan to make the Ojai Valley a model green and more sustainable community.

Community Improvement

- 1) Develop a community clean-up and beautification action plan
- 2) Focus on graffiti prevention and clean up
- 3) Improve roadway landscaping
- 4) Increase code enforcement

Community Connections

- 1) Improve dialogue between groups of people valley wide
- 2) Improve communication and coordination between government agencies
- 3) Develop a “buy local” campaign to support local agriculture and business

Affordable Housing

Youth-Teen Center

To provide the participants with background information before the second meeting, the comprehensive, core list of issues/ action items along with relevant information pertaining to each issue was distributed before the meeting. Included in the packet were specific table and individual issues corresponding to the refined core issues (Appendix g). The specific issues were identified by the name of the individual or table that came up with that issue.

Process

The goal for the second meeting was to prioritize a short list of “Easy” actionable issues that the group would like more information about. The criteria would be: 1. prioritize what will fairly quickly and easily win broad Valley wide support; 2. prioritize what will encourage Valley wide cooperation; and 3. prioritize what will do the above and have an impact on the Ojai Valley.

We then asked the following questions about the top-ranked items: 1. What information is needed to know how to plan appropriate actions steps; 2. What resources are needed to accomplish this goal; 3. Identify the major steps you think it takes to accomplish this goal; 4. In your opinion is there enough potential for success here to justify another meeting on this issue, yes or no; and 5. Do you have any special interest or background in this particular subtopic?

The discussion and decision making process would be similar to the first, with some changes made to address feedback from the first meeting. In particular, the evaluation forms indicated participants would like more uninterrupted time to deliberate and discuss issues at their table before making a decision. In addition, participants were overwhelmingly positive about the assigned seating and the opportunity to meet and learn the perspectives of new people.

To facilitate more in-depth discussion it was decided that tables would hold discussions on one action item subject at a time. For example, a table would discuss Disaster Plan/Preparedness, then participants would be given ample time to deliberate, personally rank the action items on their individual response form (Appendix h), and then vote on the table's ranking of the action items. At the end of each discussion of a particular action item subject, the entire audience would electronically rank each of the action items. The top two items would make it to a final list.

This format made it possible for participants to be assigned to a different table for different topics, thus giving them an opportunity to interact with more people. At the end of the session, participants would reconvene at their original table to rank the final list of action items.

The Second Ojai Valley-wide Discussion: April 15, 2007 1:45- 4:45 PM **(Agenda- Appendix i)**

Participants were assigned to the same table as the first meeting. The meeting began promptly at 1:45 pm with 167 participants.

Disaster Plan/Preparedness, CERT and Hospital

The meeting commenced with a PowerPoint presentation on Disaster Plan/Preparedness, CERT and Hospital. Attendees were given individual forms which allowed them to rank each action item as well as give suggestions about what information they would need to be properly prepared for a disaster (Individual Suggestions). About 20 minutes were given for table deliberation and electronic voting. The participants voted to move the following two action items to the final list:

- 1) *Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program*
- 2) *Improve communication during emergencies*

Affordable Housing

Participants at the first discussion session identified Affordable Housing as an important issue but it required a challenging solution. While it did not fit the criteria of an early win-win topic it was decided to hold a discussion during this second session about Affordable Housing so that people could share their views. Should a future group of citizens decide to work on this challenging issue, they could access the feedback from this session to help them in their efforts. The participants were asked to answer the following questions:

- 1) What are all the factors that make the issue of affordable housing a hard issue for Ojai Valley residents to reach consensus on?

- 2) What are the key steps or conceptual approaches that could make affordable housing work and be an easier issue to reach consensus on? (Click here for results)

Participants then moved to a new table.

Recreation Services Valley wide and Mass Transit/ Transportation

After a PowerPoint presentation (PowerPoint presentations), attendees were given individual forms asking them to rank each action item as well as give suggestions about what information they would need to accomplish this action item (Individual Suggestions). Every table was given 20 minutes to discuss and vote. Electronic voting determined the following items would be on the final list:

Recreation Services:

- 1) *Create a valley-wide recreation district*
- 2) *Expand recreational programs, particularly for youth*

Mass Transit:

- 1) *Improve public transit in and out of the valley and*
- 2) *Decrease car use within the valley by expanding the trolley/public transit and use of other transportation alternatives*

Participants were then asked to return to their original table.

Environmental Improvements-Preserving Open Space-Global Warming-Sustainability

After a PowerPoint presentation, participants were given individual forms which allowed them to rank each action item as well as give suggestions about what information they would need to accomplish this action item (Individual Suggestions). Tables were given 20 minutes to discuss and vote on how the table should rank the environmental action items.

For Environmental Improvements:

- 1) *Preserve existing open space in the Valley*
- 2) *Develop an environmental plan to make the Ojai Valley a model green and more sustainable community.*

Community Improvement and Connecting the Community

Next a short PowerPoint on Community Improvement and Connecting the Community was presented. Attendees were given individual forms which allowed them to rank each action item as well as give suggestions about what information they would need to accomplish this action item. Tables that were even-numbered were asked to discuss and deliberate on the topic of Community Improvement and odd-numbered tables were asked to discuss and deliberate on the topic of Connecting the Community.

After the electronic voting, the action items added to the final list were:

Community Improvement:

- 1) *Develop community cleanup and beautification action plan*
- 2) *Focus on graffiti prevention and cleanup.*

Connecting the Community

- 1) *Improve dialogue between groups of people valley-wide*
- 2) *Reduce gang activity/crime through valley-wide meetings and conflict mediation*

Youth Center

Because the first meeting responses included so many references to developing a youth center, it seemed unnecessary to deliberate the issue. So the youth center action item was automatically placed on the final list. Ten youth attended the Ojai Valley-wide Discussions. To provide an opportunity for these young people to work together and voice their opinions as a group, they moved to create two new “youth” tables for this part of the discussion. Then all the tables were asked the following:

What would be the best 3 things we could do for the youth of the Ojai Valley in the next 5 years?

After 10 minutes of discussion the youth tables presented their ideas to the audience. Other tables also shared ideas. (Click here for results.)

Final Voting

During the final electronic voting there was a glitch in our system. The results of the electronic voting were inaccurate. The next day, Supervisor Bennett’s office used the individual and table forms to hand tabulate the final results (Appendix j)

There were two action items that scored significantly above the rest:

- 1) *Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program*
- 2) *Develop an environmental plan to make the Ojai Valley a model green and more sustainable community.*

The results were emailed to all participants that morning.

Preparation for Meeting Three

The group’s two top-ranked action items would be the focus of meeting three. The responses from meeting two were reviewed and the information requested by the individuals and tables was compiled. Research was done, maps prepared and information gathered by Supervisor Bennett’s office for presentation at meeting three. Experts or people with key roles regarding these issues were invited to make presentations at the meeting, including the County Fire Chief, City Police Chief/Sheriff Captain and members of the Ojai Valley Green Coalition.

To encourage as broad of participation as possible, we invited everyone on our mailing list by e-mail or written letter to attend the final meeting. There was also an announcement in the Ojai Valley News inviting any resident who was interested to attend.

Process

Whereas the first two meetings focused on identifying and ranking issues, the third meeting was designed to provide specific ways to provide the information and tools to move toward action on top ranked items. Participants were provided with detailed presentations on what activities are

already taking place and are planned for disaster preparedness and the Ojai Valley becoming a model green community. For disaster preparedness, information from the individuals about their neighborhoods and communities would be solicited to help move the process forward. Attendees were provided with opportunities to take training classes and join existing groups. In addition, participants were given individual action ideas to assist them in taking the next steps towards Disaster Preparation and making the Ojai Valley a Model Green community.

The Third Ojai Valley-wide Discussion: October 28, 2007 1:30-4:30 PM **(Agenda- Appendix k)**

The meeting began promptly at 1:30 PM with 132 attendees.

The meeting was divided into three sections based on the top scoring issues from the previous meeting. The two top issues, Making Ojai a Model Green Community and Disaster Preparedness, took up the first two hours of the discussion and combinations of lower-ranked issues were discussed during the last hour.

Disaster Preparedness 1:30-2:30 PM

A brief update on current efforts toward better disaster preparedness and progress made in the past few months was provided.

Police Chief and Sheriff Captain Bruce Norris spoke about emergency communications in the Ojai Valley. Grant funding has been allocated for a low-power AM Radio station in the Valley and a location for the antenna has been secured. Operational Plans are in the works. Captain Norris also provided an update on the new Reverse 911 system, which enables the Office of Emergency Services to rapidly notify many residents of important emergency information via telephone. He also provided an update on HAM radio efforts in the Ojai Valley and how they are important to emergency operations, and improvements of the Sheriff and Fire radio systems.

It was acknowledged that, in the event of a major disaster/emergency, professional emergency responders would not be able to be everywhere at once. Residents need to be prepared to take care of themselves and their families. Attendees were provided with a range of disaster preparedness pamphlets and information to help themselves and their families to become adequately prepared for any type of disaster. Also included were materials from the American Red Cross, including an upcoming Red Cross training session in the Ojai Valley. (Power Point Presentation) Additionally, supplementary materials on how to prepare for pandemic influenza, bioterrorism attack, flood, pets, etc. were made available at an "Information Table".

Next Ventura County Fire Chief Bob Roper made a presentation about Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT). Chief Roper emphasized the unlikelihood of professionals having the capability to assist the entire Ojai Valley should a large scale disaster occur. He encouraged residents to receive Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training. The training provides residents with the basic knowledge and skills to help their family and neighbors before professional help arrive. CERT training is sponsored by the Ventura County Fire Department and the next training for the Ojai Valley will begin on January 16, 2007.

After the presentation, attendees were divided into seven smaller groups based on their residence. In these groups, attendees were asked to identify the hazards, resources and vulnerable populations in their communities. (Disaster Response Form- Appendix l)

Detailed maps were provided for every community. Attendees divided their community into neighborhood subdivisions that could be easily self-managed. This exercise was designed to provide a foundation and a valuable resource as the Ojai Valley becomes more disaster prepared. (Community Map Results) Participants were also asked if they would commit to CERT training and if they could recommend others in their community who might become trained and/or volunteer as a neighborhood coordinator. Of the 132 attendees, 75 said they were willing to attend CERT training and 36 said they were willing to be a CERT coordinator for their neighborhood. (Community Disaster Responses and Individual Disaster Responses)

Making Ojai a Model Green Community 2:30-3:30 PM

An award-winning video on Green Building produced by Ojai Resident Jim Jackson started this session. Next, a Powerpoint Presentation about the current energy use in the Ojai Valley was presented, followed by ways attendees could individually reduce their impact on the earth and increase the sustainability of the Ojai Valley. The audience was provided with a workbook entitled, "Low Carbon Diet: A 30 Day Program to Lose 5,000 Pounds," by David Gershon. This workbook offers simple and easy ways to decrease one's overall impact on the earth by reducing energy and water consumption, recycling, reusing, and promoting the consumption of sustainable foods and renewable energy. Also supplied, was a short list identifying steps attendees could take to reduce their impact for those who were not able to commit to the full 30 day program (Appendix m).

The meeting then shifted gears to provide attendees with an avenue for the Ojai Valley as a whole to become a model green community.

The Ojai Valley Green Coalition (OVGC) is an organization that formed in late 2006, not long after the first Ojai Valley Wide Discussion. Dr. Tim Baird, president of the Ojai Valley Green Coalition, presented a video encouraging folks to become involved in protecting and building a sustainable Ojai Valley. He also gave a presentation on how the coalition began, their committee structure and how they will go about accomplishing their goals. There are six committees in the OVGC focusing on the issues of Waste Management, Food and Agriculture, Energy Conservation, Water and Land Use, Building and Construction, Environmental Health and Transportation. Each OVGC committee chair gave a brief presentation to all attendees on the basics of their committee. Separate tables had been set up for each committee and participants were invited to visit a committee, and learn more from the committee chair about the goals and activities of that particular committee. Participants were able to leave a pre-printed "business card" with their contact information if they would like to join or be kept informed about that OVGC committee. After 10 minutes, participants were invited to visit a second committee.

Recreation and Youth 3:30- 4:30PM

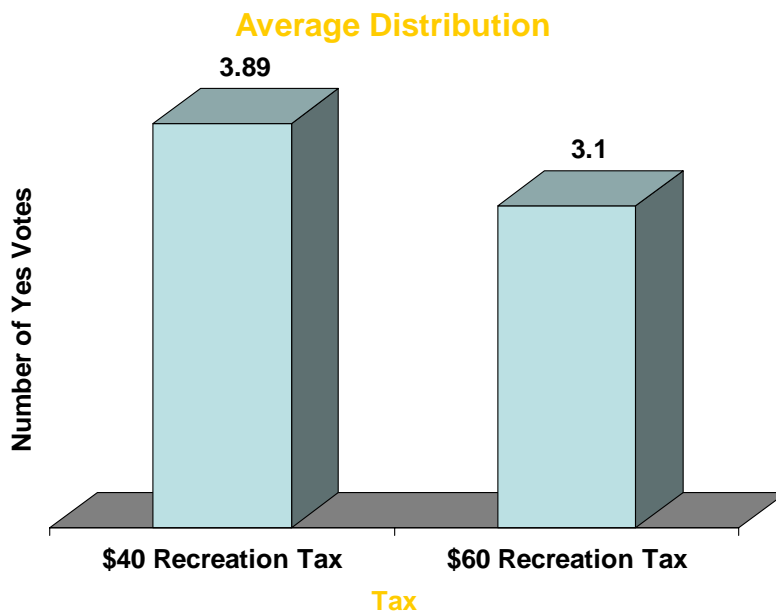
The issue of more recreation and youth facilities in the Ojai Valley was a recurrent theme among the top eight issues. Although it did not rank as one of the highest issues, it was deemed a topic worth more exploration. Supervisor Bennett presented two methods the residents of the Ojai Valley could use in accomplishing the goal of creating a recreation or youth facility.

The first option is creating a benefit assessment district. This means that a district would be created surrounding the location of the recreational facility and the rate of taxation to residents would be based on the proximity to the facility. A benefit assessment tax would require a 50% voter approval for all residents living within the benefit assessment district. However, a benefit assessment district would be complicated for a valley-wide effort. There are upfront costs of

about \$30,000, the taxation rate would vary depending upon proximity to the facility and a benefit assessment could not fund services or programs, such as supervisors or recreation leaders.

The second option is a parcel tax. It would charge every parcel in the Ojai Valley a flat amount for the recreational facility and operations. A 2/3 vote would be needed to put this into action. A parcel tax would allow for a minimal cost before the vote and a low annual administration fee. A parcel tax could fund services and programs.

To assess the amount of money the residents of Ojai are willing to be taxed to have a recreational or a youth facility, a straw poll was conducted. The number of people at each table was evened out. The tables' average size was five people per table. An anonymous vote was held at each table, which allowed attendees to vote yes or no for 1) A \$60 recreation tax and yes or no for 2) A \$40 recreation tax. Then the table leaders used the audience response system to enter the number of yes votes for each tax amount. The computer averaged the results;. If the averaged result was more than 2.5 then we could determine that more than 50% of the attendees were in favor of being taxed that particular amount. The results of the straw poll are below.



A majority of attendees were willing to be taxed either \$40 or \$60, but a significant number of attendees were more comfortable with a \$40 tax. The \$40 tax appeared to have support of more than 2/3rd of participants.

Outcomes /Conclusion

As a result of the Ojai Valley-wide Discussions:

1. Hundreds of interested citizens working with others from around the Valley developed greater understanding of shared values and concerns, and established collaborative working relationships.

2. Information on Valley demographics, government, and resources provided to over 500 residents across the Valley.
3. A broad public discussion of and prioritization of issues of importance to Valley residents. Research on these topics was provided to participants to further their understanding and decision making. The identification of high-priority issues provides an opportunity for future progress on these topics. OVWD web site and Ojai Valley News coverage brought this information to others around the Valley.
4. Outcomes Related to specific issues:
 - A) Emergency Preparedness:
 - Emergency AM Radio station in progress
 - Improved County emergency websites and radio coverage
 - Citizens Emergency Response Team training offered in Valley
 - Neighborhood emergency resources mapped.
 - B) Making Ojai a More Green and Sustainable Community:
 - Over 100 citizens referred to Ojai Valley Green Coalition
 - 150 "Low Carbon Diet" books distributed to valley households
 - County, City, and School District adoption of energy conservation and green building programs.
 - C) Recreation:
 - Formation of a Valley wide Recreation District explored, and a straw poll on funding measure conducted. Straw poll indicated participant support for tax measures for recreation facilities.

More than 160 residents of the Ojai Valley committed three Sunday afternoons to come together, broaden their contacts in the community, learn about one another and work together to identify win/win projects that would benefit the Ojai Valley. They volunteered a remarkable amount of time and energy. The input, ideas and thoughtful responses from these dedicated residents has provided inspiration and a focus on positive ways we can work together to make the Ojai Valley better. All of their efforts are much appreciated.

This report, including all of the data collected at the three discussions, is available to the public. It may be used by any person or group to plan their next steps in moving the Ojai Valley forward. Supervisor Bennett's office will monitor the efforts of the Ojai Valley Green Coalition and stay actively involved in discussions with the Fire Department, the Sheriff's Department and the Red Cross to promote continued efforts on Disaster Preparation. 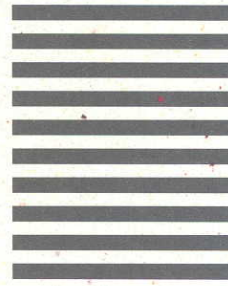

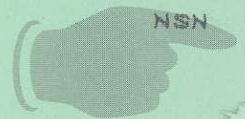


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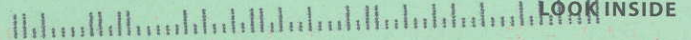

Disaster Plan/Preparedness, CERT & Hospital

Subtopics/Action Items (5) - To Be Prioritized

- A) Improve our individual ability to be prepared for disaster**
- B) Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program**
- C) Improve communication during emergencies**
- D) Improve the hospital and emergency room**
- E) Increase awareness of and better communicate the existing County and City disaster plans**

Background

While many people are not aware of it, the City and the County both have Emergency Response Plans. They are called (SEMS) Standardized Emergency Management Systems. SEMS has been adopted by the County of Ventura for managing the response to multi-agency and multi-jurisdiction emergencies. Local governments in California are required to use SEMS when their emergency operations center is activated or a local emergency is proclaimed.

The City and County SEMS plans address a wide variety of disasters and threats. The City handles all issues in the city and the County in the unincorporated area.

The Sheriff is the Director of Disaster Services for the county. The Office of Emergency Services is under the Sheriff's jurisdiction. OES coordinates the creation of the Emergency Plans and they are adopted by the City and the County. The Sheriff is the overall coordinator during disasters and operates out of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Government Center while the city EOC operates at city hall and the police station.

The Inter-Agency Coordinating Group (IACG) is an arrangement whereby the 10 cities within the county have an organizational structure and planning partnership for exchanging disaster intelligence, identifying potential resources, facilitating mutual aid, and coordinating cooperative training activities and reciprocal lines of communication.

The public middle and high school are generally the evacuation centers for the Ojai Valley. However, planning experts emphasize "to wait for direction." Depending on the nature of the disaster, shelters must first be designated as safe for providing shelter. Additionally, if your home doesn't have gas, water, electricity or sewer service, there is a good chance that the shelters don't either. 400 families of 4 in a high school gym with no toilets will not be a good situation, so it is important to wait for direction and facility readiness.

The routes into/out of the valley are vulnerable to damage from earthquake, flooding and landslide.

Evacuation routes are not provided in advance of an event as they depend on the circumstances of the emergency. In the highly unlikely event of a valley-wide evacuation, evacuation routes will have to be balanced with the needs and necessity to get emergency responders in to the valley. Evacuation planning would involve the Sheriff's Department, Fire Department, CHP, CalTrans, County Public Works and possibly the County Parks Department.

A) Improve our individual ability to use the disaster plan and be prepared for disaster

The damage caused by natural disasters such as earthquakes and floods as well as man made events such as terrorism can:

- Severely restrict or overwhelm our response resources, communications, transportation, and utilities;
- Leave many individuals and neighborhoods cut off from outside support.

It takes time for emergency response agencies to set up and prepare for an organized response. Damaged roads and disrupted communication systems may restrict their access into critically affected areas. Thus, for the initial period immediately following a disaster, individuals, households and neighborhoods may need to rely on their own resources for food, water, first aid and shelter for a week to 10 days.

The American Red Cross website www.redcross.org offers good advice on exactly what your individual disaster preparedness supply kit should include.

Individual preparedness, planning, survival skills and mutual aid within neighborhoods and worksites during this initial period are essential measures in coping with the aftermath of a disaster.

B) Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program

The CERT concept was developed and implemented by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) in 1985. They recognized that citizens would very likely be on their own during the early stages of a catastrophic disaster. Accordingly, LAFD decided that some basic training in disaster survival and rescue skills for a team of citizens in each neighborhood would improve the ability of citizens to survive until responders or other assistance could arrive. The program proved to be so beneficial that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) felt that the concept and the program should be made available to communities nationwide.

The Ojai Valley recently graduated its first CERT class. More than 30 people attended the training that began this past January, including residents of the unincorporated areas, the city of Ojai and five HAM radio operators. Training is provided by the Ventura County Fire Department. Supervisor Bennett's office hopes to schedule two more classes by the end of 2007.

More than 300 residents in Santa Paula have received CERT training.

C) Improve communication during emergencies

City and County staff as well as representatives of emergency service providers have been meeting regularly to discuss emergency issues in the Ojai Valley and improve communications regarding and during a disaster. Following those discussions, Sheriff Captain Bruce Norris has headed up the effort to install an emergency radio system to serve residents of the Ojai Valley.

Captain Norris has met with and received permission to install an antenna and equipment on the Ventura River Water District water tank. The emergency signal will reach Oak View, Meiners Oaks, Mira Monte, and Ojai to Thacher. Confirmation is needed as to whether the signal would reach Casitas Springs and Upper Ojai or would require an additional antenna.

Arrangements need to be made for an entity to take responsibility for the monthly phone service charges.

The cost for one system is approximately \$49,000 with wireless link. Captain Norris has applied to the Office of Emergency Services for a Homeland Security grant and should know by September whether his request was funded.

D) Improve the hospital and emergency room

Ojai Valley Community Hospital has merged with Community Memorial Hospital of San Buenaventura. The hospital service area includes approximately 28,000 local residents as well as a number of tourists, travelers, individuals using the local trails and national forest for recreational purposes and motorists.

The hospital is planning a new and expanded emergency department that will almost triple the floor space and double the number of beds. Plans are underway and construction is to begin early next year.

According to the California Attorney General report on the hospital merger dated March 1, 2005:

“... the Hospital can probably accommodate some additional visits without significant additional operational difficulty. Unless physicians leave the Ojai area, which may cause their patients to seek care at the emergency department as an alternative, the number of beds are sufficient to handle some increase in volume due to population growth.

The two Ventura area hospitals report visits per bed per year slightly over the ACEP benchmark, indicating that there are probably times of full occupancy and long patient waits at area emergency departments.

If the OVCH emergency department was closed, other hospitals could have trouble accommodating the resulting additional volume. Based upon the results of our analysis, we conclude that the OVCH emergency department is needed for patient access to health care not only for Ojai residents but also to avoid further adversely affecting Ventura hospital emergency departments.”

The Attorney General approved the merger with the certain conditions, those relating to the emergency room include:

- For at least three years from the transaction closing date, CMH shall maintain emergency medical services at OVCH at current levels of service and as currently licensed.
- For at least five years from the transaction closing date, CMH shall continue to provide 24-hour emergency services in Ojai, even if other hospital services are curtailed.

E) Increase awareness of and better communicate the existing County and City disaster plans.

Elected leaders, county and city staff and organizations have published articles in the local newspapers and held meetings to communicate the existing emergency resources and plans as well as the need for individual responsibility. As indicated by the responses in our first meeting, the existence of these plans is still not well known. Occasionally there is public notification regarding disaster drills and planning exercises, particularly if the drill will be seen by the public or include public participation. Opportunities exist to communicate plans, procedures and training exercises to the public to increase awareness of government’s ongoing efforts toward disaster preparedness.

- A) Create a valley-wide recreation district**

Background: There are 13 public parks in the Ojai Valley:

City: Sarazotti, Libby, Daly, Cluff Vista, skate park, Rotary Community

County: Dennison, Soule, Soule Golf Course, Camp Comfort, Oak View Community Center/Oak Dell, Oak View Park & Resource Center, Casitas Springs Community Center.

Sports fields and/or tennis courts are found at 7 public schools in addition to the parks. Private schools and churches also have sports fields and tennis courts.

Open Space and trails are available in the Los Padres National Forest, Ojai Valley Land Conservancy preserves, Ojai Valley Trail, Shelf Road, and Sulphur Mountain Road.

Lake Casitas Recreation Area offers boating, fishing, water play, picnicking, camping, nature programs, and trails, and the Bureau of Reclamation is planning a trail and recreation expansion.

Public swimming and water play are available during the summer at Nordhoff High School and the Lake Casitas Water Park. A new pool for competitive swimming for youth and adults, and a year-round public pool have been sought by residents; however a source of funding has not been identified.

A) Create a Valley-wide Recreation District

A Valley Wide recreation district would allow: coordinated management of facilities, and the ability to allow the voters valley wide to approve a tax for parks and recreation. A tax for park acquisition, construction, and maintenance could be adopted with majority voter approval, while including supervision and services would require 2/3 voter approval. A Valley Wide recreation district would require the creation of a Joint Powers Authority between at least the City and the County, and possibly the School District. A governing body would need to be created- either an elected, valley wide recreation district board or members of existing boards.

B) Improve existing sports fields and expand the number of fields available

Improving the fields currently in existence at schools and parks to bring them to AYSO, Girl’s Softball, or other league specifications has been sought by sports leagues. Constructing new sports fields for youth and adult soccer, softball, and football, and increasing the number of sports fields with night lighting has also been sought. Issues of funding, maintenance and liability all complicate these efforts.

C) Expand recreational programs particularly for youth

Besides school extracurricular activities, youth recreation programs are currently provided by: the City of Ojai, Ojai Youth Foundation, Boys & Girls Club (Oak View), after-school care providers, churches, Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H, sports leagues, pageants, music & theatre, private clubs, and private lessons/programs/studios.

Despite the seeming abundance of organizations, many youth report a shortage of after-school facilities and programs that are readily accessible and affordable. Meeting the needs of youth who, for whatever reason, are not involved in organized activities, and in providing services to underserved areas and income-challenged families seems to be a particular challenge.

D) Implement one of the miscellaneous specific suggestions generated at the first OVWD meeting

- Improve soccer fields
- Replace bleachers at Libby Park
- Supervision at Skate Park
- Improve Meiners Oaks School ball field to Girl’s Softball specifications
- Soccer field in Oak View
- Roller blading rink
- Bowling Alley
- Public Pool
- Public Gym

Transportation and Mass Transit

Subtopics/Action Items (4)- To Be Prioritized

- A) Improve public transit in and out of the valley**
- B) Decrease car use within the valley by expanding the trolley/public transit and use of other transportation alternatives**
- C) Improve road maintenance**
- D) Improve efficiency of traffic flow**

Background: The 30,000 residents of the Ojai Valley are spread out in low density development over a very large area. Topography, rivers, and existing development make a grid road system infeasible, and using State Highways 33 & 150 is necessary for traversing or leaving the valley. Transportation experts claim residential densities through most of the Valley are too low to support urban-level transit services. Car ownership is high. The valley has traditionally been a “bedroom community” for the employment centers of Ventura and neighboring counties and a substantial jobs-housing imbalance exists in the Valley. The growing tourism economy in the City of Ojai and Lake Casitas generate substantial weekend traffic. The vast majority of traffic in the Valley is locally generated trips rather than through-traffic.

Total traffic volumes on Highway 33 have changed little over the last 15 years. There is somewhat greater weekend traffic but slightly less weekday rush hour traffic. Nevertheless Highway 33 operates at Level F during rush hour.

Experts suggest reducing commuter traffic is typically the easiest traffic reduction to achieve, as the most people travel similar routes at the same time. Carpooling, transit, bicycling, compressed work weeks, and working from home are currently available alternatives that can be increased through individual action.

- School trip reduction through carpooling and busing is another easy reduction to achieve.
- Reducing local shopping and leisure trips is more difficult because destinations and travel times are widely dispersed, passengers and cargo is carried, etc. Moderate reductions can be achieved by public education, improvement of bike and pedestrian facilities, and increased Ojai Trolley frequency and expanded service area.
- Reducing tourist traffic is the most difficult. Improved Trolley service to the Ojai Valley Inn has been suggested in studies

A) Improve public transit in and out of the valley

SCAT provides the regional transit service; the City of Ojai and County are members of the SCAT joint powers authority and pay for SCAT service on a per-mile basis using federal funds. SCAT service must achieve a 20% farebox recovery rate to qualify for these federal funds. SCAT is planning to implement an express bus service to the County Government Center later this year and is working with the Ojai Trolley to streamline SCAT service in the Valley, as well as improve service regionally. SCAT Access provides ADA transit service out of the Valley. Coastal Express bus service to Santa Barbara leaves from downtown Ventura. Transit passes, transit trip planning, and a “guaranteed ride home” program are available on-line at www.goventura.org. Additional bus stop shelters are planned.

B) Decrease car use by expanding the trolley/public transit and use of other transportation alternatives within the valley.

Trolley information

The Trolley is owned and operated by the City of Ojai. The County and City share the cost using federal funds. A 10% farebox recovery rate is necessary. The lack of transit yard space constrains the City from adding additional trolleys into service. The City received a grant to initiate development of a new transit yard/service center; one site under consideration is the Honor Farm. An Ojai Valley Transit Needs Assessment was prepared in 2004 and included recommendations for service improvements. Professionals recommend that the surest way to increase ridership is to increase the frequency of service on already-successful route segments, while efficiency and frequency are increased by eliminating little-used route segments. The City is currently considering various service modifications.

Other transportation alternatives (not including the trolley)

- **Carpooling:** Instant Transit. A free on-line ride matching service is currently available at www.commutesmart.info. If drivers were to ride with just one other person, half the cars would disappear from the highway. A free "Guaranteed Ride Home" program is offered at www.goventura.org for when people miss their bus or carpool.
- **Bicycle trails/lanes:** the County and City are planning some bicycle lane improvements, however funding is always in short supply. Adding bike lanes to existing roads can be surprisingly complicated and expensive.
- **Sidewalks:** the County and City are planning various sidewalk improvements, however funding is always in short supply and often fitting sidewalks into existing developed areas is problematic (lack of right-of-way, encroachments, power poles, trees, parking, driveways, ADA compliance, etc).
- **Telecommuting and compressed work weeks:** these strategies can reduce or eliminate work trips.

C) Improve road maintenance

Caltrans, the County, and the City expend all the funds received for this purpose on this purpose. Increasing maintenance will require a new source of funding. Federal funds not spent on transit can be spent on road maintenance. The City and County repave roads as funds become available. Many streets in Meiners Oaks and Mira Monte were recently repaved.

D) Improve efficiency of traffic flow

Total traffic volumes on Highway 33 have changed little over the last 15 years. There is somewhat greater weekend traffic but slightly less weekday rush hour traffic.

Several studies have been performed in recent years regarding improving traffic flow on Highways 33 & 150:

- Caltrans' Casitas Springs Bypass/Widening Feasibility Study (2002)
- County-City Ojai Valley Traffic Circulation Study (Austin-Foust, 2002)
- County Casitas Springs Hwy 33 Short-Term Improvement Study (ATE, 2002 recommended new turn lanes, improved crosswalk, and shoulder widening)

While some of these studies' recommendations have been pursued, most have not been implemented for lack of funding and community consensus.

The Highway 33 Improvement Committee has worked with Caltrans to improve safety and traffic flow through implementation of small-scale projects such as lane striping, intersection management, turn pockets, no parking zones, new signs, and drainage and visibility improvements.

In response to a request from the Highway 33 Improvement Committee, the California Highway Patrol applied for and received a two-year grant to implement a Safety Corridor Program. Enforcement and public education were increased during this period; funding has since lapsed.

The "Courtesy on 33" Committee promotes safe, slow, and courteous driving on Highway 33 but has lost community support.

Subtopics/Action Steps (4) - To Be Prioritized

- A) Preserve existing open space in the Valley**
- B) Promote green building valleywide**
- C) Create an environmental education program**

Environmental Improvements span protecting and restoring open spaces and creeks, reducing air pollution, green building, and sustainability. There is much cross-over between this subject and others such as transportation, supporting agriculture, and community education/communications.

A) Preserve existing open space in the Valley

The basic tools of open space preservation are local government zoning, acquisition of land or easements by public or nonprofit organizations, and SOAR measures. The County Ojai Valley Area Plan zones the large open space areas as "Open Space" with minimum parcel sizes between 20 and 80 acres. These areas are also covered by the County SOAR Ordinance. Some open space lands lie within the City of Ojai. The Ojai Valley is surrounded on the west and north by public lands and the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy's Ventura River Preserve. The Conservancy actively seeks private and public funding for additional acquisition and restoration projects.

B) Promote green building

Building Codes are established by the State and little opportunity exists for developing different local codes. Some cities and counties offer incentives such as speedier permit processing for green buildings. The County is pursuing making large new county buildings Green Building Certified and is evaluating incentives. Various financial incentives are offered by the federal and state governments and utility companies for energy efficiency building upgrades, energy reducing new construction, and solar energy. Public education also plays a role.

C) Create an environmental education program

An environmental education program could be offered through public and private schools, churches, service clubs, on local cable TV, and at community events. The program could address projects around the valley, measures people can take at home and at work, transportation, local success stories, and regional or national efforts.

D) Develop an environmental plan to make Ojai a model green and more sustainable community

An environmental plan could tie-together the above elements and provide a framework and road map for local efforts. Greenhouse gas reduction through reducing energy use (electricity and natural gas), reducing fuel consumption in transportation, alternative fuels, solar and wind energy, practicing the approach of

“Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle” and growing one’s own food could be addressed. Professional assistance may be desirable. The Ojai Green Coalition is working toward similar purposes.

Subtopics/Action Steps (4)- To Be Prioritized

Small beautification projects can add up to significant improvements in the appearance of the Valley. Volunteer tree planting along the Ojai Trail and Highway 33 have been performed by Boy Scouts and the Oak View Civic Council, and other groups have landscaped barren areas. Many individuals pick up trash along roads and the Ojai Trail, and numerous home and business owners have substantially improved the appearance of their properties. Increased enforcement efforts have reduced illegal signs

A) Develop community clean-up and beautification action plan

Identify and prioritize clean-up projects, line-up volunteers and supporters, work with property owners.

B) Focus on graffiti prevention and clean up

The Group Against Graffiti is a group of volunteers that carry out graffiti abatement. Prompt abatement of graffiti serves as a deterrent in addition to removing blight. Graffiti should be reported to the Ojai Police who will then forward the report to the Group Against Graffiti.

C) Improve roadway landscaping

Caltrans and county road budgets barely cover road repairs and do not provide for ornamental landscaping. Volunteers have planted many trees along Highway 33 and the Ojai Valley Trail. Some private properties along the highway lack landscaping.

D) Increase code enforcement

Enforcement of building, grading, and sign violations has generally been compromised by a lack of funds. Recently, the County has increased funding and adopted a new fine system. However, like other municipal services, code enforcement service in the county unincorporated areas is not provided at city service levels. A citizen effort to report sign violations in Oak View resulted in removal of many illegal signs.

Subtopics/Action Steps (5)- To Be Prioritized

- A) Improve dialogue between groups of people valleywide**

A) Improve dialogue between groups of people valleywide

Ojai Valley residents communicate valley-wide through a vast network of organizations, groups and congregations. Most of these are formed by people coming together with a shared common interest and most of them include people from throughout the valley. Examples are HELP of Ojai, Ojai Valley Youth Foundation, Ojai Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy.

The Ojai Valley News and the local cable channel allow residents to learn about one another and offer ideas for newsworthy articles and information about community events.

More recently new technology has allowed residents to communicate via the internet on sites such as those hosted by www.ojainetwork.com and www.theojai.com.

There are some barriers that exist to valleywide communication between specific groups. Children in the valley attend two different school districts, and the communication between private and public schools is limited. Separate government jurisdictions such as county, city, and water districts all have different communication structures, policies and procedures.

Geographical location may be a barrier to some communication efforts. Residents of the Upper Ojai may find it difficult or inconvenient to attend meetings or gatherings in Casitas Springs and vice versa.

Communication is usually more positive when groups focus on what they have in common, certainly until trust is built. Discussions regarding difficult issues might be accomplished through professionally facilitated community forums where residents are encouraged to present a variety of viewpoints.

Groups and organizations could make a concerted effort to communicate with each other and to work collaboratively on joint efforts. An example of this is the Community Connections effort that is working toward better communication between non-profit organizations in the Ojai Valley. Government meetings open to the public are another venue for sharing concerns and opinions.

If the proposed valleywide broadcast radio station became operational, one option would be to have it broadcast more than just during emergencies. This would provide an additional way to share information throughout the valley. The phone books include event calendars, the Chamber of Commerce maintains a calendar on their website, and www.ojaievents.com is an up-to-date website that provides a calendar of events.

Finally, meetings such as these Valleywide Discussions are specifically focused on fostering this dialogue across the valley.

B) Improve communication by government and between governments

The City and County have good relations and a cooperative working relationship. Although both have different elected leaders and staff, efforts are made to communicate policies. In some cases such as the Social Host Ordinance, a concerted and successful effort was made to have consistent policies in both the City and County. The County, City and various emergency responders/service providers meet twice yearly to improve communication, planning and response to emergencies and disasters.

In the early 1990's the City of Ojai undertook a major study of expanding the City valleywide. The conclusion was that it would financially hurt existing City residents and therefore was not pursued. Joint Powers agreements between the City, County, and School District are possible to address specific services, such as recreation or transportation (SCAT is one such JPA).

There are two public water agencies that pump from the Ventura River groundwater basin, and several agencies plus the Southern California Water Company that draw from or regulate the Ojai Groundwater Basin. The Casitas Municipal Water District operates the federally owned dam and diversion, and serves water both on a wholesale and retail basis. Several private mutual water companies also serve agricultural and residential customers. The Association of Water Agencies of Ventura County provides a forum for the exchange of information on local and regional water issues.

C) Create and sustain a valley-wide "Buy Local" campaign

There are many on-line resources for establishing "Buy Local" campaigns, particularly for food. These organizations both assist local groups in setting up local campaigns, as well as directly assisting farmers and consumers. (www.buylocal.org, foodroutes.org, caff.org, buylocalday.org, localharvest.org)

D) Reduce gang activity/crime through valleywide meetings and conflict mediation

While the Ojai Valley gangs represent a relatively small problem compared with gangs in other areas, there has been much concern about recent gang activity. It is estimated that the Ojai Valley is home to 50 or so gang members. There are two gangs in the valley: a Latino group with about 35 members; and a second gang of about 15 or so mostly white youths from Oak View. It is not against the law to associate with a gang. Until the group breaks the law, the police have limited options.

There were about 50 calls to the Police Department for service related to gangs in the last year. Per the Ojai Valley News, Captain Bruce Norris: "Most of those were to report graffiti in the city of Ojai, serious

crimes such as assault, robbery and weapons violations occurred throughout the valley. Because many crimes go unreported by the victims, I believe that gang-related crimes were significantly higher.”

In December 2006 the Ventura County Board of Supervisors approved funding of a special four-deputy anti-gang task force to focus on West County activity, including gangs in the Ojai Valley.

The Ventura County Sheriff’s Department has established a Gang Tip Hotline. This hotline, 1-888-58GANGS, was created to allow residents of gang-infested neighborhoods a way to anonymously report on-going gang activity.

Gang activity has fallen since last summer after several convictions. Law enforcement tactics to prevent gang crime include making contact with gang members, arresting them at every opportunity, conducting random searches of the homes of those on probation, having the school resource officer interact with students suspected of gang association and take action when possible, prompt graffiti abatement and pressing for stiff sentences. Street Terrorism Gang Enhancement laws allow for increased sentences for gang members.

E) Improve programs that help elders stay in their homes

The Ventura County Human Services Agency’s In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program provides assistance to those eligible aged, blind, or disabled individuals who are limited in their ability to remain in their own homes without this service. The IHSS program will help pay for services provided to a person so that he or she can remain safely at home. IHSS is considered an alternative to out-of-home care, such as a nursing home or board and care facility. A person may be eligible for IHSS if he or she meets *all* of the following:

- Is over age 65, or disabled or blind;
- Receives SSI/SSP, or is low income with low assets (the government has specific limits);
- Is a U.S. citizen or permanent resident;
- Has California residency;
- Lives in a private residence;
- Needs help to remain safely at home.

For those who exceed income and asset eligibility requirements for government programs, there are private agencies that provide in-home assistance services for a fee. These services may include: skilled nursing, home health aides, housekeeping, shopping, personal care, errands, safety supervision, chore services, grooming/hygiene, live-in services, transportation, light housekeeping, meal preparation, medication reminders and bathing/dressing, physical therapy, speech/language pathologists, occupational therapy, and medical social services.

HELP of Ojai Caring Neighbors program provides volunteers to telephone, visit, and provide support and occasional practical assistance to frail elderly people, the handicapped or those with chronic illness.

Additional Issue Information

Create/improve a valleywide visitor center

The Ojai Valley Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center operates a visitor center in downtown Ojai, but promotes businesses and attractions valleywide, including through its website and phone services. The City of Ojai reduced its funding of the visitor center during its recent budget problems (from \$50,000 in 04/05 to currently providing free rent to the Museum to provide visitor services)

Develop restrictions on franchise businesses

Restricting franchise businesses is under consideration by the City of Ojai. Federal restraint-of-trade laws prohibit treating one business differently from another. Communities have adopted size, design, sign, and product type regulations to partially address this issue.

Expand the Ojai Library

Under the Library District governing structure, the City of Ojai is the lead agency for the Ojai Library. Periodically, State bond funding becomes available for library expansions.

Voter approved parcel taxes in both the City and surrounding unincorporated areas fund enhanced service levels at the Ojai Library, however these tax measures did not provide for inflationary increases and their purchasing power is steadily eroding. The City of Ojai is coordinating an effort for expanding the library.

Completion of Little House/West Campus/Honor Farm

The Plan for West Campus: to expand HELP of Ojai's "Little House" to the "Big House"; to develop a multi-tenant non-profit center; to encourage access and utilization of adjacent open space and maximize agricultural use.

West Campus Project Objectives: all HELP of Ojai projects implemented on the site must meet four initial requirements- that they be do-able, fundable, sustainable and meet with the mission of HELP of Ojai. West Campus tenants (other than HELP programs) will be selected according to their ability to enhance HELP of Ojai's financial viability, their contribution to implementation of the general objectives of the West Campus, and the compatibility of their mission with that of HELP of Ojai.

Prevent flooding, particularly along Thacher and San Antonio Creeks

There are many homes and farms within the floodplains of Thacher and San Antonio Creeks. Other developed areas of the Valley are also subject to flooding. Extensive, and expensive, levees and channeling would be needed to remove these areas from floodplains. Much of this work would require environmental permits that would be challenging to obtain.

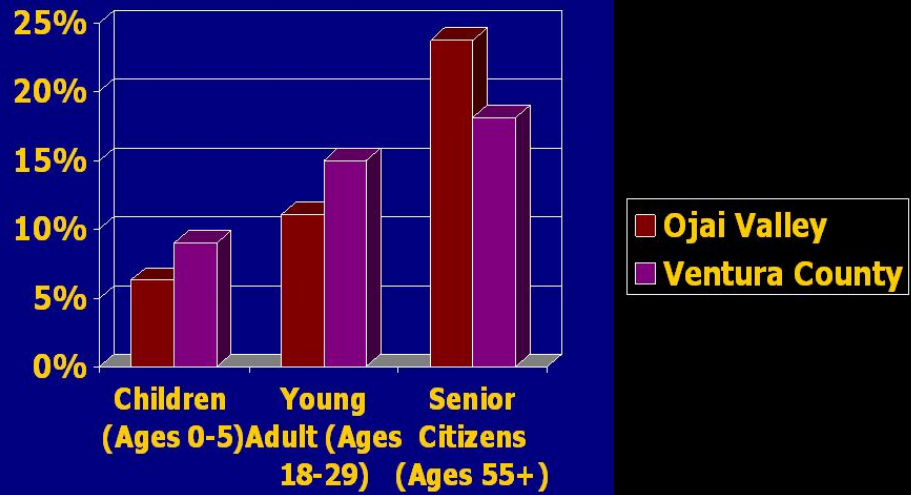
Ethnicity in the Ojai Valley

Environmental Improvements span protecting and restoring open spaces and creeks, reducing air pollution, green building, and sustainability. There is much cross-over between this subject and others such as transportation, supporting agriculture, and community education/communications.

A) Preserve existing open space in the Valley

The basic tools of open space preservation are local government zoning, acquisition of land or easements by public or nonprofit organizations, and SOAR measures. The County Ojai Valley Area Plan zones the large open space areas as "Open Space" with minimum parcel sizes between 20 and 80 acres. These areas are also covered by the County SOAR Ordinance. Some open space lands lie within the City of Ojai. The Ojai Valley is surrounded on the west and north by public lands and the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy's Ventura River Preserve. The Conservancy actively seeks private and public funding for additional acquisition and restoration projects.

B) Promote green building

Building Codes are established by the State and little opportunity exists for developing different local codes. Some cities and counties offer incentives such as speedier permit processing for green buildings. The County is pursuing making large new county buildings Green Building Certified and is evaluating incentives. Various financial incentives are offered by the federal and state governments and utility companies for energy efficiency building upgrades, energy reducing new construction, and solar energy. Public education also plays a role.

C) Create an environmental education program

An environmental education program could be offered through public and private schools, churches, service clubs, on local cable TV, and at community events. The program could address projects around the valley, measures people can take at home and at work, transportation, local success stories, and regional or national efforts.

D) Develop an environmental plan to make Ojai a model green and more sustainable community

An environmental plan could tie-together the above elements and provide a framework and road map for local efforts. Greenhouse gas reduction through reducing energy use (electricity and natural gas), reducing fuel consumption in transportation, alternative fuels, solar and wind energy, practicing the approach of “Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle” and growing one’s own food could be addressed. Professional assistance may be desirable. The Ojai Green Coalition is working toward similar purposes.

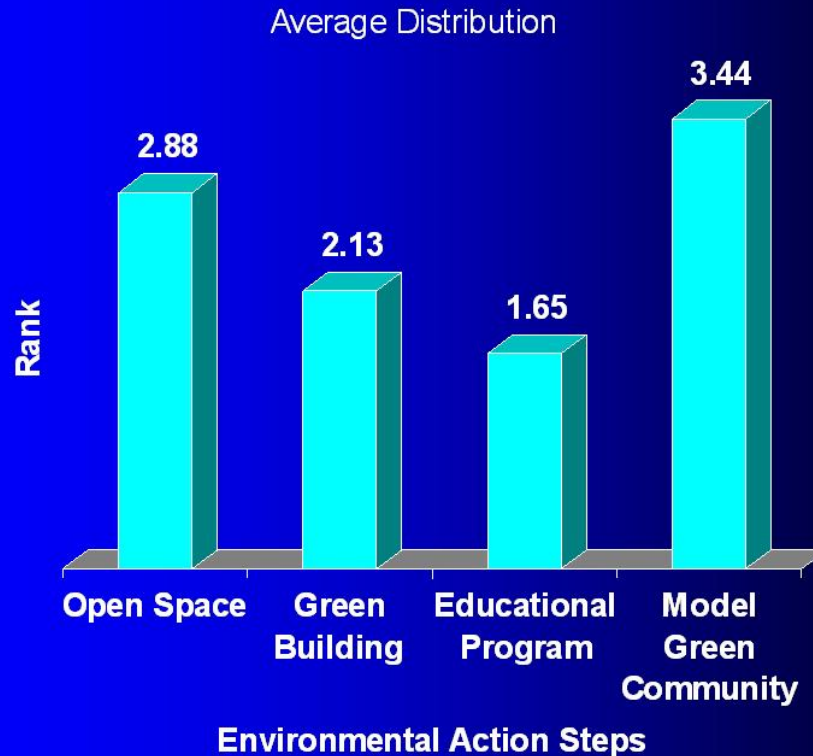

Background

While many people are not aware of it, the City and the County both have Emergency Response Plans. They are called (SEMS) Standardized Emergency Management Systems. SEMS has been adopted by the County of Ventura for managing the response to multi-agency and multi-jurisdiction emergencies. Local governments in California are required to use SEMS when their emergency operations center is activated or a local emergency is proclaimed.

The City and County SEMS plans address a wide variety of disasters and threats. The City handles all issues in the city and the County in the unincorporated area.

The Sheriff is the Director of Disaster Services for the county. The Office of Emergency Services is under the Sheriff's jurisdiction. OES coordinates the creation of the Emergency Plans and they are adopted by the City and the County. The Sheriff is the overall coordinator during disasters and operates out of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at the Government Center while the city EOC operates at city hall and the police station.

The Inter-Agency Coordinating Group (IACG) is an arrangement whereby the 10 cities within the county have an organizational structure and planning partnership for exchanging disaster intelligence, identifying potential resources, facilitating mutual aid, and coordinating cooperative training activities and reciprocal lines of communication.

The public middle and high school are generally the evacuation centers for the Ojai Valley. However, planning experts emphasize "to wait for direction." Depending on the nature of the disaster, shelters must first be designated as safe for providing shelter. Additionally, if your home doesn't have gas, water, electricity or sewer service, there is a

good chance that the shelters don't either. 400 families of 4 in a high school gym with no toilets will not be a good situation, so it is important to wait for direction and facility readiness.

The routes into/out of the valley are vulnerable to damage from earthquake, flooding and landslide.

Evacuation routes are not provided in advance of an event as they depend on the circumstances of the emergency. In the highly unlikely event of a valley-wide evacuation, evacuation routes will have to be balanced with the needs and necessity to get emergency responders in to the valley. Evacuation planning would involve the Sheriff's Department, Fire Department, CHP, CalTrans, County Public Works and possibly the County Parks Department.

A) Improve our individual ability to use the disaster plan and be prepared for disaster

The damage caused by natural disasters such as earthquakes and floods as well as man made events such as terrorism can:

- Severely restrict or overwhelm our response resources, communications, transportation, and utilities;
- Leave many individuals and neighborhoods cut off from outside support.

It takes time for emergency response agencies to set up and prepare for an organized response. Damaged roads and disrupted communication systems may restrict their access into critically affected areas. Thus, for the initial period immediately following a disaster, individuals, households and neighborhoods may need to rely on their own resources for food, water, first aid and shelter for a week to 10 days.

The American Red Cross website www.redcross.org offers good advice on exactly what your individual disaster preparedness supply kit should include.

Individual preparedness, planning, survival skills and mutual aid within neighborhoods and worksites during this initial period are essential measures in coping with the aftermath of a disaster.

B) Improve our neighborhood ability to be prepared for disaster, including a valley-wide CERT program

The CERT concept was developed and implemented by the City of Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) in 1985. They recognized that citizens would very likely be on their own during the early stages of a catastrophic disaster. Accordingly, LAFD decided that some basic training in disaster survival and rescue skills for a team of citizens in each neighborhood would improve the ability of citizens to survive until responders or other assistance could arrive. The program proved to be so beneficial that the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) felt that the concept and the program should be made available to communities nationwide.

The Ojai Valley recently graduated its first CERT class. More than 30 people attended the training that began this past January, including residents of the unincorporated areas, the city of Ojai and five HAM radio operators. Training is provided by the Ventura County Fire Department. Supervisor Bennett's office hopes to schedule two more classes by the end of 2007.

More than 300 residents in Santa Paula have received CERT training.

C) Improve communication during emergencies

City and County staff as well as representatives of emergency service providers have been meeting regularly to discuss emergency issues in the Ojai Valley and improve communications regarding and during a disaster. Following those discussions, Sheriff Captain Bruce Norris has headed up the effort to install an emergency radio system to serve residents of the Ojai Valley.

Captain Norris has met with and received permission to install an antenna and equipment on the Ventura River Water District water tank. The emergency signal will reach Oak View, Meiners Oaks, Mira Monte, and Ojai to Thacher. Confirmation is needed as to whether the signal would reach Casitas Springs and Upper Ojai or would require an additional antenna.

Arrangements need to be made for an entity to take responsibility for the monthly phone service charges.

The cost for one system is approximately \$49,000 with wireless link. Captain Norris has applied to the Office of Emergency Services for a Homeland Security grant and should know by September whether his request was funded.

D) Improve the hospital and emergency room

Ojai Valley Community Hospital has merged with Community Memorial Hospital of San Buenaventura. The hospital service area includes approximately 28,000 local residents as well as a number of tourists, travelers, individuals using the local trails and national forest for recreational purposes and motorists.

The hospital is planning a new and expanded emergency department that will almost triple the floor space and double the number of beds. Plans are underway and construction is to begin early next year.

According to the California Attorney General report on the hospital merger dated March 1, 2005:

"... the Hospital can probably accommodate some additional visits without significant additional operational difficulty. Unless physicians leave the Ojai area, which may cause their patients to seek care at the emergency department as an alternative, the number of beds are sufficient to handle some increase in volume due to population growth.

The two Ventura area hospitals report visits per bed per year slightly over the ACEP benchmark, indicating that there are probably times of full occupancy and long patient waits at area emergency departments.

If the OVCH emergency department was closed, other hospitals could have trouble accommodating the resulting additional volume. Based upon the results of our analysis, we conclude that the OVCH emergency department is needed for patient access to health care not only for Ojai residents but also to avoid further adversely affecting Ventura hospital emergency departments.”

The Attorney General approved the merger with the certain conditions, those relating to the emergency room include:

- For at least three years from the transaction closing date, CMH shall maintain emergency medical services at OVCH at current levels of service and as currently licensed.
- For at least five years from the transaction closing date, CMH shall continue to provide 24-hour emergency services in Ojai, even if other hospital services are curtailed.

E) Increase awareness of and better communicate the existing County and City disaster plans.

Elected leaders, county and city staff and organizations have published articles in the local newspapers and held meetings to communicate the existing emergency resources and plans as well as the need for individual responsibility. As indicated by the responses in our first meeting, the existence of these plans is still not well known. Occasionally there is public notification regarding disaster drills and planning exercises, particularly if the drill will be seen by the public or include public participation. Opportunities exist to communicate plans, procedures and training exercises to the public to increase awareness of government’s ongoing efforts toward disaster preparedness.

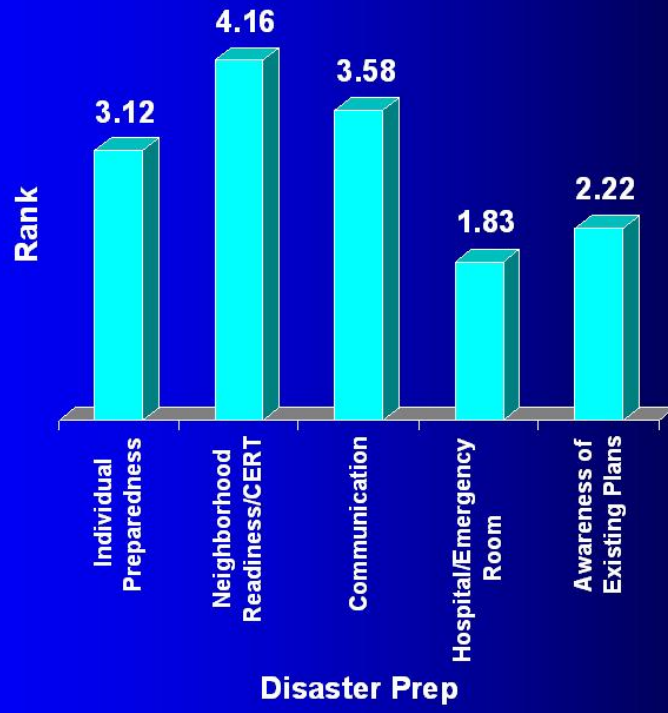

Sports fields and/or tennis courts are found at 7 public schools in addition to the parks. Private schools and churches also have sports fields and tennis courts.

Open Space and trails are available in the Los Padres National Forest, Ojai Valley Land Conservancy preserves, Ojai Valley Trail, Shelf Road, and Sulphur Mountain Road.

Lake Casitas Recreation Area offers boating, fishing, water play, picnicking, camping, nature programs, and trails, and the Bureau of Reclamation is planning a trail and recreation expansion.

Public swimming and water play are available during the summer at Nordhoff High School and the Lake Casitas Water Park. A new pool for competitive swimming for youth and adults, and a year-round public pool have been sought by residents; however a source of funding has not been identified.

A) Create a Valley-wide Recreation District

A Valley Wide recreation district would allow: coordinated management of facilities, and the ability to allow the voters valley wide to approve a tax for parks and recreation. A tax for park acquisition, construction, and maintenance could be adopted with majority voter approval, while including supervision and services would require 2/3 voter approval. A Valley Wide recreation district would require the creation of a Joint Powers Authority between at least the City and the County, and possibly the School District. A governing body would need to be created- either an elected, valley wide recreation district board or members of existing boards.

B) Improve existing sports fields and expand the number of fields available

Improving the fields currently in existence at schools and parks to bring them to AYSO, Girl's Softball, or other league specifications has been sought by sports leagues. Constructing new sports fields for youth and adult soccer, softball, and football, and increasing the number of sports fields with night lighting has also been sought. Issues of funding, maintenance and liability all complicate these efforts.

C) Expand recreational programs particularly for youth

Besides school extracurricular activities, youth recreation programs are currently provided by: the City of Ojai, Ojai Youth Foundation, Boys & Girls Club (Oak View), after-school care providers, churches, Boy and Girl Scouts, 4-H, sports leagues, pageants, music & theatre, private clubs, and private lessons/programs/studios.

Despite the seeming abundance of organizations, many youth report a shortage of after-school facilities and programs that are readily accessible and affordable. Meeting the needs of youth who, for whatever reason, are not involved in organized activities, and in providing services to underserved areas and income-challenged families seems to be a particular challenge.

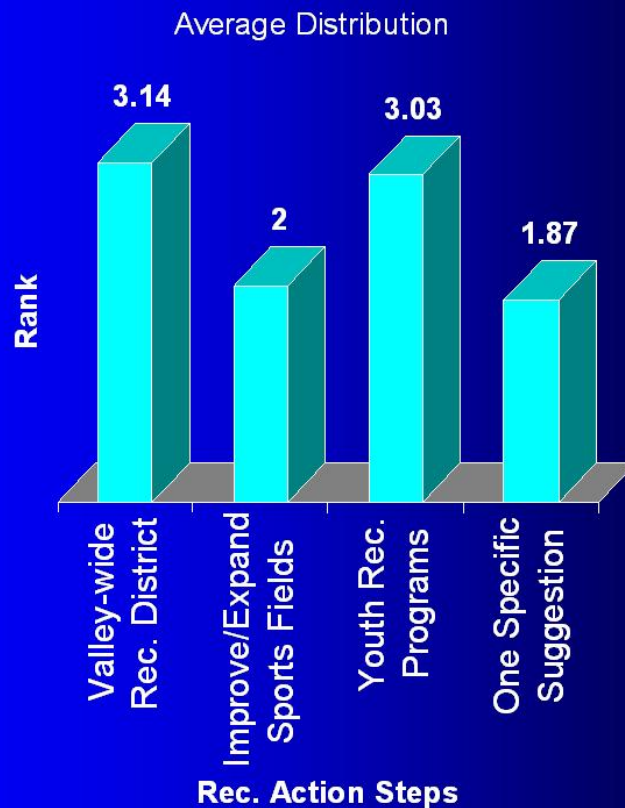

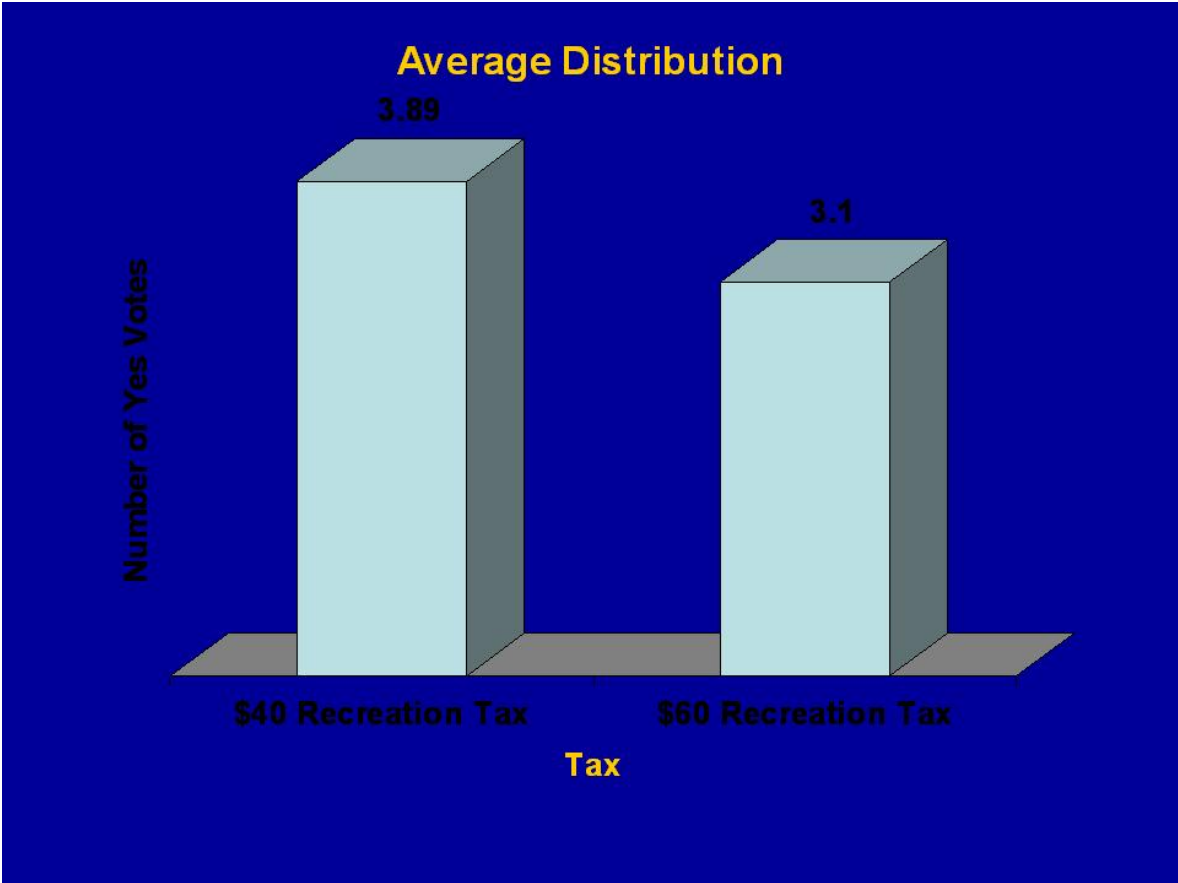

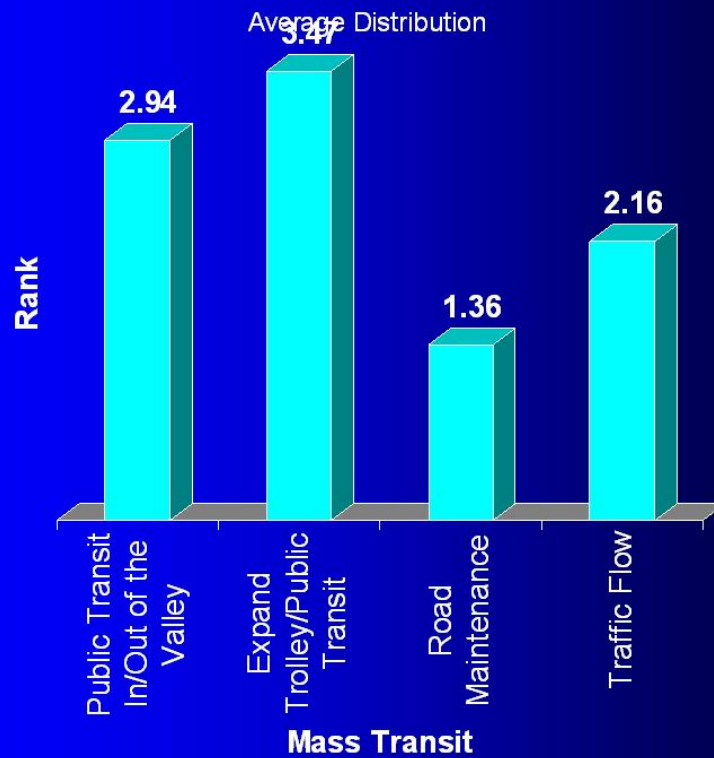

Subtopics/Action Steps (4)- To Be Prioritized

- A) Develop community clean-up and beautification action plan**
- B) Focus on graffiti prevention and clean up**
- C) Improve roadway landscaping**
- D) Increase code enforcement**

Small beautification projects can add up to significant improvements in the appearance of the Valley. Volunteer tree planting along the Ojai Trail and Highway 33 have been performed by Boy Scouts and the Oak View Civic Council, and other groups have landscaped barren areas. Many individuals pick up trash along roads and the Ojai Trail, and numerous home and business owners have substantially improved the appearance of their properties. Increased enforcement efforts have reduced illegal signs

A) Develop community clean-up and beautification action plan

Identify and prioritize clean-up projects, line-up volunteers and supporters, work with property owners.

B) Focus on graffiti prevention and clean up

The Group Against Graffiti is a group of volunteers that carry out graffiti abatement. Prompt abatement of graffiti serves as a deterrent in addition to removing blight. Graffiti should be reported to the Ojai Police who will then forward the report to the Group Against Graffiti.

C) Improve roadway landscaping

Caltrans and county road budgets barely cover road repairs and do not provide for ornamental landscaping. Volunteers have planted many trees along Highway 33 and the Ojai Valley Trail. Some private properties along the highway lack landscaping.

D) Increase code enforcement

Enforcement of building, grading, and sign violations has generally been compromised by a lack of funds. Recently, the County has increased funding and adopted a new fine system. However, like other municipal services, code enforcement service in the county unincorporated areas is not provided at city service levels. A citizen effort to report sign violations in Oak View resulted in removal of many illegal signs.

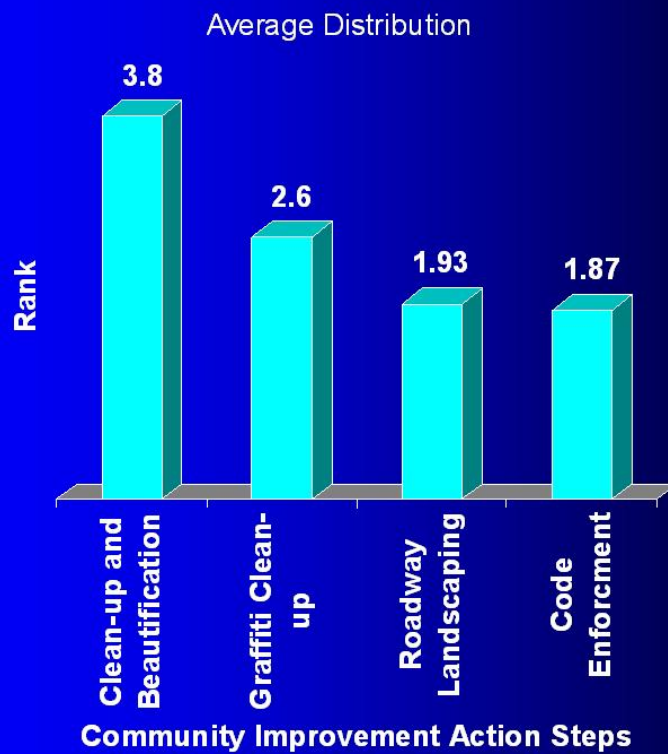

A) Improve dialogue between groups of people valleywide

Ojai Valley residents communicate valley-wide through a vast network of organizations, groups and congregations. Most of these are formed by people coming together with a shared common interest and most of them include people from throughout the valley. Examples are HELP of Ojai, Ojai Valley Youth Foundation, Ojai Valley Chamber of Commerce and the Ojai Valley Land Conservancy.

The Ojai Valley News and the local cable channel allow residents to learn about one another and offer ideas for newsworthy articles and information about community events.

More recently new technology has allowed residents to communicate via the internet on sites such as those hosted by www.ojainetwork.com and www.theojaipost.com .

There are some barriers that exist to valleywide communication between specific groups. Children in the valley attend two different school districts, and the communication between private and public schools is limited. Separate government jurisdictions such as county, city, and water districts all have different communication structures, policies and procedures.

Geographical location may be a barrier to some communication efforts. Residents of the Upper Ojai may find it difficult or inconvenient to attend meetings or gatherings in Casitas Springs and vice versa.

Communication is usually more positive when groups focus on what they have in common, certainly until trust is built. Discussions regarding difficult issues might be accomplished through professionally facilitated community forums where residents are encouraged to present a variety of viewpoints.

Groups and organizations could make a concerted effort to communicate with each other and to work collaboratively on joint efforts. An example of this is the Community Connections effort that is working toward better communication between non-profit

organizations in the Ojai Valley. Government meetings open to the public are another venue for sharing concerns and opinions.

If the proposed valleywide broadcast radio station became operational, one option would be to have it broadcast more than just during emergencies. This would provide an additional way to share information throughout the valley. The phone books include event calendars, the Chamber of Commerce maintains a calendar on their website, and www.ojaievents.com is an up-to-date website that provides a calendar of events.

Finally, meetings such as these Valleywide Discussions are specifically focused on fostering this dialogue across the valley.

B) Improve communication by government and between governments

The City and County have good relations and a cooperative working relationship. Although both have different elected leaders and staff, efforts are made to communicate policies. In some cases such as the Social Host Ordinance, a concerted and successful effort was made to have consistent policies in both the City and County. The County, City and various emergency responders/service providers meet twice yearly to improve communication, planning and response to emergencies and disasters.

In the early 1990's the City of Ojai undertook a major study of expanding the City valleywide. The conclusion was that it would financially hurt existing City residents and therefore was not pursued. Joint Powers agreements between the City, County, and School District are possible to address specific services, such as recreation or transportation (SCAT is one such JPA).

There are two public water agencies that pump from the Ventura River groundwater basin, and several agencies plus the Southern California Water Company that draw from or regulate the Ojai Groundwater Basin. The Casitas Municipal Water District operates the federally owned dam and diversion, and serves water both on a wholesale and retail basis. Several private mutual water companies also serve agricultural and residential customers. The Association of Water Agencies of Ventura County provides a forum for the exchange of information on local and regional water issues.

C) Create and sustain a valley-wide "Buy Local" campaign

There are many on-line resources for establishing "Buy Local" campaigns, particularly for food. These organizations both assist local groups in setting up local campaigns, as well as directly assisting farmers and consumers. (www.buylocal.org, foodroutes.org, caff.org, buylocalday.org, localharvest.org)

D) Reduce gang activity/crime through valleywide meetings and conflict mediation

While the Ojai Valley gangs represent a relatively small problem compared with gangs in other areas, there has been much concern about recent gang activity. It is estimated that the Ojai Valley is home to 50 or so gang members. There are two gangs in the valley: a Latino

group with about 35 members; and a second gang of about 15 or so mostly white youths from Oak View. It is not against the law to associate with a gang. Until the group breaks the law, the police have limited options.

There were about 50 calls to the Police Department for service related to gangs in the last year. Per the Ojai Valley News, Captain Bruce Norris: "Most of those were to report graffiti in the city of Ojai, serious crimes such as assault, robbery and weapons violations occurred throughout the valley. Because many crimes go unreported by the victims, I believe that gang-related crimes were significantly higher."

In December 2006 the Ventura County Board of Supervisors approved funding of a special four-deputy anti-gang task force to focus on West County activity, including gangs in the Ojai Valley.

The Ventura County Sheriff's Department has established a Gang Tip Hotline. This hotline, 1-888-58GANGS, was created to allow residents of gang-infested neighborhoods a way to anonymously report on-going gang activity.

Gang activity has fallen since last summer after several convictions. Law enforcement tactics to prevent gang crime include making contact with gang members, arresting them at every opportunity, conducting random searches of the homes of those on probation, having the school resource officer interact with students suspected of gang association and take action when possible, prompt graffiti abatement and pressing for stiff sentences. Street Terrorism Gang Enhancement laws allow for increased sentences for gang members.

E) Improve programs that help elders stay in their homes

The Ventura County Human Services Agency's In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program provides assistance to those eligible aged, blind, or disabled individuals who are limited in their ability to remain in their own homes without this service. The IHSS program will help pay for services provided to a person so that he or she can remain safely at home. IHSS is considered an alternative to out-of-home care, such as a nursing home or board and care facility. A person may be eligible for IHSS if he or she meets *all* of the following:

- Is over age 65, or disabled or blind;
- Receives SSI/SSP, or is low income with low assets (the government has specific limits);
- Is a U.S. citizen or permanent resident;
- Has California residency;
- Lives in a private residence;
- Needs help to remain safely at home.

For those who exceed income and asset eligibility requirements for government programs, there are private agencies that provide in-home assistance services for a fee. These services may include: skilled nursing, home health aides, housekeeping, shopping, personal care, errands, safety supervision, chore services, grooming/hygiene, live-in services, transportation, light housekeeping, meal preparation, medication

reminders and bathing/dressing, physical therapy, speech/language pathologists, occupational therapy, and medical social services.

HELP of Ojai Caring Neighbors program provides volunteers to telephone, visit, and provide support and occasional practical assistance to frail elderly people, the handicapped or those with chronic illness.

Additional Issue Information

Create/improve a valleywide visitor center

The Ojai Valley Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center operates a visitor center in downtown Ojai, but promotes businesses and attractions valleywide, including through its website and phone services. The City of Ojai reduced its funding of the visitor center during its recent budget problems (from \$50,000 in 04/05 to currently providing free rent to the Museum to provide visitor services)

Develop restrictions on franchise businesses

Restricting franchise businesses is under consideration by the City of Ojai. Federal restraint-of-trade laws prohibit treating one business differently from another. Communities have adopted size, design, sign, and product type regulations to partially address this issue.

Expand the Ojai Library

Under the Library District governing structure, the City of Ojai is the lead agency for the Ojai Library. Periodically, State bond funding becomes available for library expansions. Voter approved parcel taxes in both the City and surrounding unincorporated areas fund enhanced service levels at the Ojai Library, however these tax measures did not provide for inflationary increases and their purchasing power is steadily eroding. The City of Ojai is coordinating an effort for expanding the library.

Completion of Little House/West Campus/Honor Farm

The Plan for West Campus: to expand HELP of Ojai's "Little House" to the "Big House"; to develop a multi-tenant non-profit center; to encourage access and utilization of adjacent open space and maximize agricultural use.

West Campus Project Objectives: all HELP of Ojai projects implemented on the site must meet four initial requirements- that they be do-able, fundable, sustainable and meet with the mission of HELP of Ojai. West Campus tenants (other than HELP programs) will be selected according to their ability to enhance HELP of Ojai's financial viability, their contribution to implementation of the general objectives of the West Campus, and the compatibility of their mission with that of HELP of Ojai.

Prevent flooding, particularly along Thacher and San Antonio Creeks

There are many homes and farms within the floodplains of Thacher and San Antonio Creeks. Other developed areas of the Valley are also subject to flooding. Extensive,

and expensive, levees and channeling would be needed to remove these areas from floodplains. Much of this work would require environmental permits that would be challenging to obtain.
