These three statements are not enough.

One more step is necessary.

Look at plain silk; hold uncarved wood. The self dwindles; desires fade. 19

Discontinue sagacity, abandon knowledge

The people benefit a hundred times Discontinue benevolence, abandon righteousness

The people return to piety and charity Discontinue cunning, discard profit Bandits and thieves no longer exist These three things are superficial and insufficient

Thus this teaching has its place: Show plainness, hold simplicity Reduce selfishness, decrease desires 19

Forget about knowledge and wisdom, and people will be a hundred times better off.

Throw away charity and righteousness, and people will return to brotherly love. Throw away profit and greed, and there won't be any thieves.

These three are superficial and aren't enough to keep us at the center of the circle, so we must also:

Embrace simplicity. Put others first. Desire little.
